- New T/E species plan



## A Look Back ... Maine's 2005 Wildlife Action Plan




- Landscape conservation focus





- Must be approved by USFWS
- New requirements / expectations





#### A Look Forward ... 2015 National Guidance




- Much more prioritization!!

- Plan brevity, modules, and links







Fine Filter: SGCN











Priority 1: 58 spp.


Priority 2: 131 spp.

Priority 3: 185 spp.






#### Habitat Stressors (IUCN)











#### **General comments:**

There are >100 occurrences statewide, but concerns remain about declines in southern Maine and range-wide. 6 of 6 reviewers recommend SC listing.

#### State Special Concern or NMFS Species of Concern:


Lithobates pipiens is listed as a species of Special Concern in Maine.




